### Viking students observe 'A Moment of Science':

#### Lab Interconversions of Matter and Phase Changes

In In the lab, students investigated interconversions of matter or better known as phase changes of matter using dry ice which is solid carbon dioxide and regular ice blocks of water to demonstrate the process of water cycle and sublimation on earth. The students observed dry ice change directly into gaseous carbon dioxide without going through the liquid phase and when the gaseous carbon dioxide was covered, it changed into solid carbon dioxide.

Lab instructor, Dr. Chukwudi Udokwu, explained to the students that such a process that does not go through the liquid phase is called sublimation.

Students also observed regular ice go from solid ice block water to liquid water, and later after adding heat, the liquid water evaporated into water vapor. As the boiling water inside the beaker on top of the hot plate was covered for a period of 20 minutes, water droplets started to form under the glass cover showing condensation. Students were asked to explain the relationship between the phase changes of ice block water, to liquid water, to water vapor and later condensed back into liquid water droplets to the process of water cycle on earth.



#### What is the MAP/EOC Test?

The Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) and End of Year (EOC) testing for students in all KCPS schools will take place during the month of March. MAP/EOC tests are mandated by the state and are intended to help determine what a child knows and is able to do according to the expectations for his or her grade level. Scores on the MAP tests are also used to determine how schools are performing according to state and federal guidelines.

#### What is the Missouri Assessment Program (MAP)?

The MAP/EOC tests are a series of tests that measure a child's performance in school. It is mandated by the state to identify the knowledge, skills, and competencies that Missouri students should acquire by the time they graduate. You can read more about the test format, grade-level expectations and how to interpret your child's scores and achievement levels on the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Assessment web page.

#### Why is the MAP/EOC important?

It is a way to finding out if students are learning what they need to learn. The test will show what your child knows and is able to do according to the expectations for his or her grade level.

#### What can I do to help my child succeed on these tests?

- 1. Attend: Make sure your child is in school on the testing dates.
- 2. Rest: Have your child get a good night's sleep.
- 3. Nutrition: Give your child a healthy breakfast start the day.

#### When will my child take the MAP test?

Your school will inform you of the exact dates your child will be tested. If you have questions about the test, please contact your child's school counselor.

#### When will my child take the MAP test?

Your school will inform you of the exact dates your child will be tested. If you have questions about the test, please contact your child's school counselor. For more information about MAP, please read MAP Information for Parents section.

#### **MAP/EOC End-of-Course Assessments**

KCPS will be taking MAP & EOC tests April 20<sup>th</sup> through May 15<sup>th</sup>. Parents: Please make sure your child does not miss a day during this period. These tests are important to their end of year grade. The assessments will be given to students enrolled in the courses teaching similar content and skills. The tests are not specific to any grade level, but rather to course content.

The purposes for the MAP/EOC assessments are:

- Measuring and reflecting student mastery toward postsecondary readiness.
- Identifying student's strengths and weaknesses in English, Math, Science and Government.
- Communicating expectations for all students.
- Serving as the basis of state and national accountability plans for middle schools and high schools.
- Evaluating programs.

The MAP/EOC tests were created by DESE in an effort to adapt testing to the needs of Missouri districts, schools, teachers, and students while meeting state and federal requirements. Districts may determine which courses best align with the Course Level Expectations being measured and assessed through the MAP/EOC tests, thus giving schools and districts the flexibility to test at the right time.



### DECA program at Northeast High School provides students with real-world skills

After years of not being active at Northeast High School, the DECA (Distributive Education Clubs of America) program has returned at full force to offer new learning opportunities for students. DECA, which is a program that focuses on developing business and leadership skills through competitions and leadership conferences, picked up momentum at Northeast when Andrew Corrao came to the school in 2020.

Andrew Corrao, CTE (career and technical education) professor, reactivated the program in 2021 when students returned to the classrooms after being online due to the pandemic. Since it reemerged, the program has more than doubled from eight competing students to over 25 currently.

When asked about the school's journey to the state competition, Corrao says that the journey truly began two years ago when the decision was made to bring the program back. "The plan was to take the first two years to figure out how to run and build a program like DECA at an urban school and then really drive at winning competitions the third year," Corrao said. "However, our students surpassed our expectations and made a run at state the past two years."

In order to prepare the students for the competitions and academic conferences, DECA fundamentals and content are incorporated in the classrooms. From there, students in business or marketing classes are recruited to participate in the competitions. At the competitions, students are given 10-15 minutes to review a scenario and come up with a solution to the problem involving executive business decisions, business law or marketing. Other students also compete by providing presentations on sale pitches or research projects.

"This year we have over 25 students competing in the district tournament with five of them qualifying to participate in the state tournament. We are very fortunate to have the support of the district, school and CTE department. These investments in programs like

DECA are crucial in teaching our students that not only do they have a right to be just as involved as their suburban peers, but that they can compete and beat them," said Corrao.

Currently, the school has 5% of its total population involved with DECA, a percentage they want to maintain and grow. In addition to being able to compete against local schools and participate in the state tournament if they qualify, students can go on trips to other cities within the country to participate in academic conferences. Recently, six students traveled to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to participate in the Central Region Leadership Conference, where they had the opportunity to network and compete with students from around the country.

"I think of the learning opportunities that come with being on a plane for the first time to travel to Milwaukee and Boston. We have students who went on that trip that have never been outside of the KC metro, let alone on an airplane," Andrew Kreiling, DECA advisor and business professor, said. "I hear students elaborate how this field trip gave them a better understanding of how the big picture looks, or that field trip informs them more on something that we work on in the classroom."

Through the program, students have been able to improve their interviewing skills, presentations and work ethic as well as create new networks and friendships. As the students continue preparations for the state tournament, Corrao says it would not be possible to give the students this opportunity without the support of the community.

"From parents, to alumni, to people who just happened to hear about our program, our students feel the support. They know that their results are not only a win for them, but for the school and the entire community and we couldn't be more proud of them."


























#### VIKINGS take over Main Event
